Stephanie Good teaches science at Interstate 35. It's not laid out in her lesson plan; however, she instills the values of hard work, responsibility, dedication, and honesty in her students. Due to her upbringing and close family ties, she has a tremendous influence on those around her; her family, students, friends, and children benefit from her relentless work ethic and "tough love".

Good grew up on a farm with her three siblings where she developed her work ethic and family bond, two defining features of her today. Even from a young age, Good has made a point of working hard to make others better.

"I had been working on finishing my bachelor's degree and I only had a couple of classes left. Things were very hectic- I was trying to raise children, get everything accomplished at home and help with the farm. It became overwhelming. I was just going to quit with those last two classes left. She [Stephanie] looked at me and she said 'Mom you've never allowed us to quit a day in our lives. I'm not going to allow you. I'm going to make sure I'm home with three younger kids every night. You have a class, and I'll take

care of things here at home so that you can go finish those two classes and so you can get your degree.' It made a very huge impact on my life. It's greatly impacted my career over the time span," explained Dara Queck, Good's mother and best friend; a characteristic made evident to Dara Queck.

Good moved from a smaller farm in Runnells, to a much larger one in Truro when she was fifteen. As a sophomore, Good started attending Interstate 35 where she was, "dedicated, hard working, and an honor to have as a student," according to former I-35 teacher, Jane Busby.
