Living in a foreign country can be very scary, especially without your friends and family. Junior Yusriza Aisya is a foreign exchangestudent from Indonesia. Aisya admits that although she is proud to be a Muslim, it has proven to be especially difficult during her time in the US.

"Everyday life is not very helpful because we have to pray at certain times. Pork is not allowed, we have to eat certain Halal foodsm," Aisya said.

The busy American lifestyle, and fast changing seasons make praying five times a day very challenging for Aisya. There is a larger issue faced by the Muslim community however; Aisya describes this issue as "Muslim fear."

"Some people think Muslim culture teaches terrorism but it does not. It is like any other religion. There are a lot of similarities. It is about trust in a higher being. I know that here at school I can easily be a Muslim, but on the street they talk to me like I would never understand what they are talking about. People see me as different," Aisya said.

There are a lot of preconceived ideas about the Muslim community that Aisya says are false stereotypes. Back in her home country of Indonesia, there are many different types of religions, all of which are respected by the others. This causes little to no conflict. Aisya said it makes her sad that this may be the last time she and other Muslims like her will be able to visit the U.S.

"It makes sad to be here and see the change in power in your country. We [Muslims] will be with you and we believe in respecting you. We hope you do the same," Aisya said.

When asked if she had any advice for Muslims in the U.S. facing any prejudice due to their religion, Aisya simply responded,

"Be confident, and breathe. Sometimes I feel really uncomfortable and really down. If people drag you down, be sure to pull yourself up."
