Members suit up to raise money for band program

Cheers of delight and excitement from around Johnston could be heard and mattresses could be seen on Nov. 2. A handful of excited kids faced the fierce cold weather as they headed out to promote the ongoing mattress fundraiser by standing on street corners with bright gold signs, some students even took on the task of dressing up as a mattress. "I wasn't very smart," senior Karsten Theilen said. "I forgot to bring a coat or anything so I was freezing!"

At the beginning of September, the band grew discouraged because their yearly marching invitational was cancelled due to the threat of thunderstorms and lightning throughout the day. This cancellation caused the band program to lose about \$10,000. However, the band students were encouraged by the upcoming mattress sale that had been set up to help raise funds. "I was pretty skeptical about selling mattresses because it seemed very unusual for a school fundraiser," Theilen said. "It just didn't seem like something people would buy."

While the fundraiser was mainly about earning funds, it was also about fun. On the corner

of 86th Street and 62nd Avenue junior Zoey Kloewer stood with her group of friends waving her sign attempting to turn cars toward the high school when something happened. "There was a group of sophomore guys, and when they pulled past us on our side of the street, one of them asked me to go out with him and gave me his number!" Kloewer said.

There was also a group of boys that kept driving by them and at one point, while they were stopped at the light, they tried to serenade Theilen from across the street

The mattress sales earned the band program \$11,655 with 58 mattresses sold along with some bed accessories, helping them get back the money they lost. Senior Caroline Christensen was out of town and when she got back; she was shocked to hear how much the fundraiser actually earned, "I'm surprised but everyone was really dedicated to the sale. Who would have thought mattresses would raise thousands of dollars?"
