## Bettendorf High School staff member begins selling Black Lives Matter hats

Recently, Bettendorf hats with Blue Lives Matter flags on them were displayed at a Bettendorf High School open house. To preface, I don't believe schools should issue statements on controversial and sensitive topics. Black Lives Matter should never have been politicized, considering it is about human rights. With that being said, Bettendorf High School should release a formal apology to its students for displaying these hats.

Similarly to All Lives Matter, Blue Lives

Matter has turned into a form of retaliation to the Black Lives Matter Movement. The phrases "All Lives Matter" and "Blue Lives Matter" were coined after the Black Lives Matter Movement was founded, but how did all of this come to be?

Black Lives Matter was created out of a place of suffering. It was created in an America where black people are victims of police brutality almost every single day. Ahmaud Arbery, George Floyd, Tamir Rice, Trayvon Martin, Breonna Taylor, Jacob Blake...the list of victims goes on.
