FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) is a government program that provides financial aid and scholarships based on "need." That's the problem. It's a common misconception that parents are required to cover their child's tuition. Many don't- and they shouldn't have to.

Thus, the "privileged" middle-class students like me, whose parents feel it's important for us to contribute to our own higher education, are trying to come up with the same amount of money as everyone else. However, we're not eligible for the same financial aid opportunities. Ironically, it makes our needs greater.

For example, FAFSA specifically aims to provide aid to

those in lower-income families. Such students will qualify for a Pell Grant worth over \$5,000 per academic year. Plus, these grants and scholarships will not be taxed. These are small examples.

So, now hard-working parents like mine are further punished for their accomplishments. When the government increases taxes and denies scholarship opportunities to their children, it enforces the expectation that parents SHOULD be required to pay for their kid's college.

While the money my parents have worked for is viewed as excess by the government, what they fail to understand is that it's theirs-theirs to choose where to use it, when to use it, and how to use it. They've earned that right-they've worked for it.

Yet, those who choose not to find a job and don't have higher education are given a surplus of government aid. All the while, the working class is taxed more. Doesn't this discourage the environment that our country claims to foster? "The American Dream:" where hard work causes you to have more penalties! Great.

I feel like it's only fair to redistribute scholarship opportunities based on more than simply parental income. It's not about obtaining the greatest opportunities. It's the fact that you're willing to achieve within the opportunities you're giv-
