DeLong's hard work reflects in her stats

Wildcat basketball player Isabelle DeLong is leading the team in scoring for the second year in a row.

Coming into this season, DeLong had the most varsity experience out of the returning players and had to bring some leadership to the team.

"She does a nice job when out on the floor to help keep the team composed," said Head Coach Ross DeLong, Isabelle's

"That's not something that shows up in the stat book, but it's very important to the team."

Isabelle DeLong has improved tremendously this year. She leads the team in scoring and in rebounds. After 11 games played, she was averaging 17.6 points per game and shooting 35 percent overall from the field and 38 percent from behind the three-point line.

"I have gotten so much better at taking better shots and knowing when to throw a pass or not," said DeLong. "For me, this year the game has really 'slowed down' and has become easier to process what I should or shouldn't do."

DeLong also found her spot in the Wildcat record books after a home game against North Cedar in December. She scored 37 points against the Knights, passing former Wildcat Stacy Schlapkohl's record of 36 points in one game.

DeLong said breaking the single-game scoring record was truly "a dream come true."

"The girls with their names on the

record boards are some of the best athletes that went through Durant, and it's crazy that I can now be a part of that," said DeLong.

"I was really excited for her," said her father who also holds the single-game scoring record for the boys' team. "Nights like that don't come around too often. Her teammates really did a nice job of getting her the ball when she was open. They recognized that she was having one of those nights. You can't have a night like that without everybody's involvement."

In response to DeLong's success this season, she has faced many box and one defenses from teams trying to shut her down.

"In response to that, I just stay patient; I don't force things and look for my open teammates," said DeLong

DeLong feels most comfortable on the court whenever she has the ball.

"I love being able to create open looks for my teammates and myself," said DeLong.

Although DeLong leads the team in scoring, she doesn't feel any pressure to provide the bulk of the scoring.

"As a team, I feel that we do a very good job of getting the ball to the girl with the 'hot hand,'" she said. "That differs from game to game, but everyone does their fair share of scoring."

The Wildcats are now 3-9 as of Jan.

"Our focus is on taking care of the basketball and limiting turnovers that lead to easy baskets for the other team," said Coach DeLong. "The goal is always to make improvements every day."
