The annual Drake Relays track meet in Des Moines took place from April 22-25. The girls' team qualified fifteen girls while the boys' placed in two events. To qualify for the Drake Relays is a feat on it's own. The top ranked eighty-one sprint relay teams qualify to compete, while the distance and field events only allow twenty four competitors.

"Qualifying takes a lot of hard work and dedication. It shows that we are good enough to compete against the best runners in the state," said sophomore Jenna Murphy.

The boys' team had two competitors place in the top eight. Senior Garret Jansen placed 6th in the discus with a throw of 166-08 feet, while junior Chase Van Sant placed 6th in the long jump with a jump of 21-03.00 feet.

"I felt good about how I jumped overal! I felt I performed as well as I could have and being there was a big event for me. It was a goal of mine to compete there for a long time," said Van Sant.

The girls' team sent fifteen girls, five of which were seniors and three freshmen. Whether it was the first run for a freshman or one of the last on the Blue Oval for a senior, the Lady Dutch used this meet to send a message to other teams around the state that they are tough competitors for the state meet in May.
