Charlie Sheen will not be having a day off like Ferris Bueller anytime soon. Sheen recently confessed on a live interview on NBC, "I am, in fact, H.I.V. positive." The icon has had a rough path for a while, and this news, sent the media over the edge.

Sheen admitted that he had paid millions to try to keep the doctors quiet, but decided that it was finally time to reveal his secret to end the payments. He had known of the virus for four years, and thought he had a brain tumor at first. The actor has takes four pills a day, and does not know how he contracted the disease.

Sheen told reporters that he had told all of his former girlfriends of his diagnosis, although one of them said she learned about it "right along with everyone else." Bree Olson, one of Sheen's past girlfriend, was with him months after he learned about the the diagnosis. She said to Howard Stern, "he never said anything to me...I was his girlfriend. I lived with him. We were together. We had sex almost every day for a year." Ms Olsen has been tested for H.I.V. and has tested negative.

"If he has one person come out and say: 'I saw the interview, I went to get tested. I have H.I.V. We never had a conversation about you having H.I.V. before we had sex. I have been damaged. You are going to pay,' that is a problem for him," says Mike Paul, the president of reputation doctors.

Throughout the years, Sheen has admitted the use of drugs and prostitutes could have caused or worsened his situations. Sheen was once one of the highest paid actors. After his drug meltdown, his most renowned show 'Two and a Half Men,' fired him from the series. Which, ironically enough, had him casted as a womanizer.

Sheen said that he has not missed any of his medication since the beginning of his diagnosis, and is not using any recreational drugs, but still drinks often.

Friday the 13th was certainly unlucky this November. On this day, a 14 year old from Treynor, named Tristan White was hit by a car and killed. The news was devastating. Not only did it affect the Treynor community itself, it made an impact on the lives of many surrounding cities as well.

It was just three days before he started his freshman wrestling career, and he was running along the side of the road with two of his teammates in preparation for the season. It was just before 4 pm and they were running south along a gravel road, and so was an SUV when the tragedy happened. CPR was performed on him by a Treynor deputy and fire department worker, he was then life flighted to the Nebraska Medical Center, where he was pronounced dead.

Tristan was very talented, and it was predicted that he was going to have a fantastic season. Tristan's father, Greg White, is the assistant wrestling coach and his sister, Mackenzie White, is the manager. "My heart is absolutely breaking for the White family. We'll all miss you so much Tristan. I know Treynor Wrestling will never be the same," said Tristan's teammate and friend, Alex Larsen. Now, without him, his teammates are going to be affected forever. His family and friends are all hurting and in shock. The community is struggling, but they're not alone. The hashtags #TreyNorStrong and #GodsGotYou became popular on social media along with many encouraging words from students and parents all over southwest Iowa. Just the day after the accident, Tristan's family had already been flooded with love and support. On the 14th, Mackenzie tweeted "Never in my life have I been so thankful for my town and the surrounding communities for all the support, you are all incredible people."

Tristan's visitation was held on November 18th at Hoy Kilnoski Funeral Home and his funeral was held on the 19th at First Christian Church. November 19th, the day of the funeral, would have been Tristan's 15th birthday. They let off green balloons in honor of him, because green was his favorite color.

The Treynor district had so much support behind it that many southwest Iowa wrestling teams took pictures with a sign that said "#TreyNorStrong" to show their support, and even Iowa State University's wrestling team heard about it and joined in. Although Treynor isn't technically our community, when in times of grief, it is very uplifting to know that we have each other's back. LC graduate Jordan Bailey said, "It breaks my heart, but it's pretty amazing to witness how well a community comes together after a tragedy!" When push comes to shove, the problems of our neighbors hit close to home.
