## Spencer Kluesner

Some people find their passion in running, baking, reading, or singing. Freshman Spencer Kluesner has found his passion in raising chickens.  
In 2014 Kluesner decided he had an itch to start up a chicken business.  
"It's just a hobby farm. I always thought they (chickens) were cool, and I wanted farm-fresh eggs," Kluesner said.  
After helping his father with flooring at the flooring store, Kluesner earned enough money to purchase a chicken coop. He started with 30 chickens and currently has 27 with 40 more chicks on the way. Of Kluesner's 27 chickens, he has 14 different breeds.  
"I like to see all of the cool different types of birds I can find," Kluesner said.  
One of Kluesner's favorite aspects of the chickens is watching them grow from chicks to chickens to see how they mature and change.  
As Kluesner worked to expand his flock of chickens, he built a second coop with the help of his grandpa.  
"Building and buying things for the chickens has given me great memories with my grandpa," Kluesner said.  
Every day Kluesner spends about 20 minutes in the morning and another 20 minutes in the evening feeding and watering his chickens. Also, once a month Kluesner cleans out the chickens' coops, which usually takes about two hours.  
Kluesner doesn't keep all of his eggs to himself though. He has some regular clients, including staff and students such as Mark Philgreen and Chris Sands (9).  
Sometimes the chickens will escape the coop and wander around the Kluesner's hot tub, but in general the work of raising chickens is not too demanding.  
"What I like most about the chickens is having time to be able to do a lot of other things, like sports or hanging out with my friends, because (chickens) are relatively low maintenance," Kluesner said.
