











Jeam overcomes challenges to win state

The minutes felt like hours as the competition cheer team sat waiting to hear the results. The team impatiently watched the clock; and they sat in a circle holding hands, breathing heavily. "I don't think we ever believed we could actually do it," junior Sarah Schade said. Finally, they heard second place awarded to Valley. "We didn't think we had won until they called that Valley got second," Schade said. For the first time in school history, the cheer team won the state championship title.

This was no simple accomplishment for the team. The girls had multiple setbacks at the beginning of the year. "A few people [quit] here and there, causing the routine to change multiple times," junior Ally Holton said.

The cheer season was long and tasking. "Cheer is a big commitment starting from May through January, so the girls have to really want to do it," coach Kate Safris said.

Along with teammates quitting, they also had to deal with girls getting major injuries. Junior Mryn Johnson got a serious concussion while pulling the tug of war rope at Rock Around the Clock when she was kicked in the back of the head. This then caused her head to be smacked into the ground in front of her. "As I've been told my memory, eyesight, and concentration will not be the same as it was before because this is my second severe concussion,"

The team's stunts required four girls, but if one got


injured and needed to be taken out, then the rest of the girls had to readjust the entire routine. "We were already a small team to begin with, and we really strive to be the best of the best," Schade said.

The loss of teammates made it difficult for them to find a confidence in their routine. They never thought that they would do well in competition. "Cheer, I don't think people realize, is kind of like basketball or football," Safris said. "We have positions, so if we lose our quarterback the rest of the team could be good, but if you don't have a quarterback you're in trouble."

The girls had believed since the beginning of their season that they would not win, they were unsure of how good the other teams were. "We always told everyone we were awful, we convinced everyone we were really bad," Schade said. "Then we ended up winning state and surprised everyone."

Their success continued onto Dallas, placing fourth at nationals, the highest placing in school history. Bringing in a coach who was also a choreographer from the South helped them create a routine that was able to hit the difficulty needed to win. "We were really fortunate that our squad was really young this year, with over half of our squad being underclassman," Safris said. "The skill level in Johnston is here, the talent is absolutely here," she said.
