## TPers suffer the wrath of administration

Around 11 p.m. on the night of Sunday, Sept. 25, about 35 students met up behind Wallace Elementary to TP the high school. The job was done quickly, with some students leaving after 15 minutes. Everyone was told to only use toilet paper and to not do anything stupid.

Before Homecoming Week, the school sent all students and parents an email explaining that any activities involving toilet paper were not allowed. The email informed everyone that students on school grounds outside of school-sponsored events would be considered trespassing and would face consequences through the Code of Conduct and possible legal charges. "I have friends who TPe'd last year and all they had to do is clean up so I thought the punishments could not be that bad," senior Stefanie Stanicic said.

Monday morning, principal Ryan Woods called some of the offenders to his office and banned them from all fall activities, along with the Code of Conduct standard punishments. "Initially, I thought it was the stupidest thing they could have said, with all due respect," senior Viet Tran said. "I fully understand they sent out an email we were not supposed to do it but it is a school tradition. I would have understood one or two games

but considering parents paid for activity passes and some of us were the loudest in the student section it is not good."

Senior Shelby Christensen agreed that the punishment was unfair. "I was upset that I could not go to the football games," she said. "I have been to every game since I was in fifth grade. It has been a big part of my life so it sucks that my senior year I could not go."

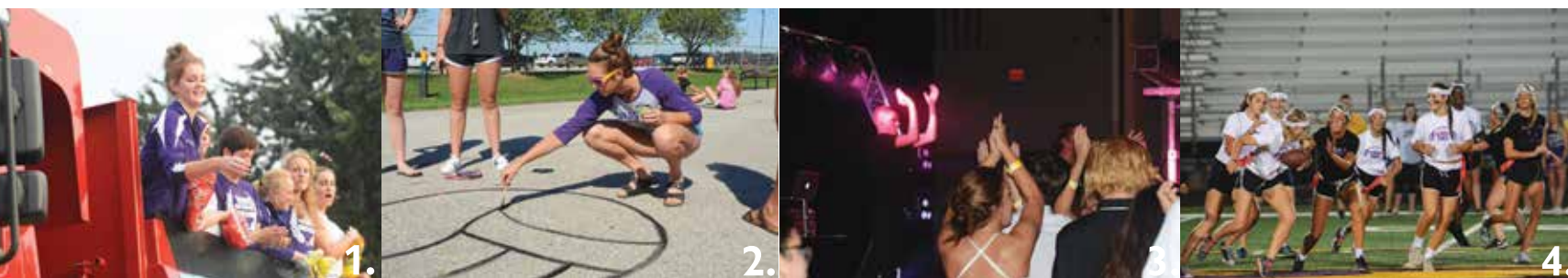
