"The greatest thrill at state was definitely playing in Principal Park with my team," graduate Nolan Monthei said. "It's always a blast playing on that nice of a field."

The team played against Waukee in the 4A quarterfinals at Principal Park. Graduate Jared Erickson allowed only two hits through the first five innings, and the team led 2-0 until the sixth when their opponent got a two-run homer. "After the home run, our whole team stayed extremely positive, but they just had a rally going and we couldn't get them out," senior Jack Dreyer said. "We fought until the last out but couldn't get it done."

Waukee scored the third run of the rally on a single, a wild pitch and a double. In the seventh, the team had a chance to tie the game, but senior Alex MacGregor was thrown out at home.

"The most challenging thing at state was getting the team ready to play in the tournament," Monthei said. They practiced for several hours every week, to prepare for state.

"The team put more work in before the first game then they've ever done before," head coach Michael Barta said. The boys went from one game each week to multiple games a day which took a toll on players. The increase in games brought on injuries. Dreyer's shoulder forced him to not participate. The stress of state put the team on edge especially because their number one pitcher was not able to play the rest of the season.


The boys placed seventh overall. "Unfortunately, we couldn't get the win but just making it to state was a huge accomplishment," Dreyer said.
