Originality shined in the halls with unique costumes that evoked the wearer's creativity.

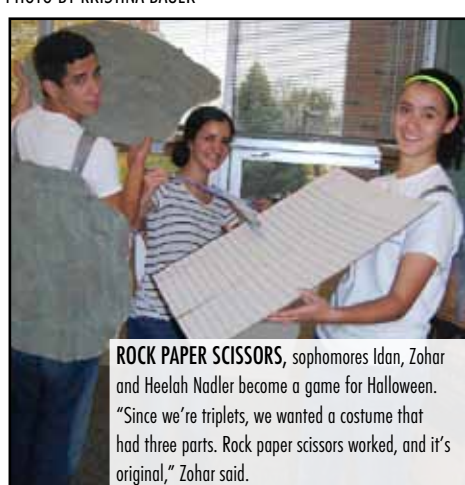
"My friends picked the idea," said Kenzie Greiner '16, who dressed as a Sim. "It was cool that other people freaked out and knew what I was."
