Fall sports end with championships, success

Fall sports ended with accomplishments as each team took their last stride towards victory.

The cross country team wrapped up their seasons as both girls' and boys' teams placed first in the district. Freshman Tess Roorda placed first in districts while freshman Payton Phelps placed third. Junior Ben Warner placed fourth, junior Sawyer Burton placed eighth, and sophomore Adam Sievers placed ninth.

Both teams qualified for state and traveled to Fort Dodge. Each team placed fourth overall. Roorda was state champion, the first female state cross country champion in school history. Warner finished 14th.

The volleyball season wrapped up after advancing to the second round with a 3-0 win over Knoxville on Halloween. They fell 1-3 to Indianola in Carlisle Nov. 5. The girls ended their season as co-conference champions with Newton.

The 11-1 football team earned the district title and then annihilated Fairfield 56-14 in their first playoff game, and then advanced to a 37-14 win over Winterset. The season ended with a 14-0 loss to Washington as the Demons avenged an earlier loss to the Little Dutch.

"It was a fantastic season. Everyone did their best, and it was a great start for the Bill Van Horn sports trophy season," said Athletic Director Dale Otte.

Don't Drink the Water Lively show entertains audiences


